



What does telling an idea look like?

- stating your thoughts in a way everyone can understand

What does good questioning look like?

- doesn't have a yes/no answer
- deepens your understanding
- encourages the group to think more about a topic
- can be controversial or consensus-building
- clarifies any misunderstood concepts
- extends the discussion further when conversation lulls
- not basic recall
- seeks the opinion of others (and cares about what they answer)



Some examples of asking a question:

- Joe Student, you haven't mentioned what you thought about X. What were you thinking?
- I'm unsure what you meant by X. Can you clarify for me?
- I'm really confident about my answer for #4. What did you find? Are you confident about your answer?



What does good listening look like?

- body language – focused on the speaker
- facial expression – look like you're interested
- not interrupting to get your point in
- staying with your group
- acknowledging what has been said

What does knitting ideas together look like?

- builds on what someone else has said
- looks at trends in the way the group thinks

Some examples of knitting ideas together:

- When you said X it made me think of Y
- The majority of us think XYZ, though it looks like we differ on some details
